Spring 2024 Membership Meeting

On Sunday, March 17, 2024 at 3:00pm, the Spring 2024 Membership Meeting was held at the Sigal Music Museum at Heritage Green. The program was titled "Listening to Greenville's History" and was presented by Greenville Music Preservation and its co-founder, David Sims. The presentation gave a broad overview of the development of music in Greenville in the 19th and 20th centuries. Important artists, venues, radio stations, and recording studios were talked about and we explored Greenville's history through the lens of music. Recordings from area musicians such as Josh White, Esquerita, Charlie Spivak and others were played and examined. There were also a large amount of items from the GMP collections on display. There was an excellent turnout by members and the public.

The new fiscal year 2024-25's business was conducted and a new slate of officers and members-at-large were voted in. We would like to welcome our new President John Nolan and members-at-large, Candace Boatwright and Tom Cheves. We said good-bye to our outgoing President Robert Benedict and we thank him for his dedicated service to the Society.
